
On behalf of the Secretary of Defense, enclosed is the "Quarterly Report on Activities of the Department of Defense in Support of United Nations Inspections in Iraq" for the First Quarter of Fiscal Year 2003. This submission is pursuant to the Weapons of Mass Destruction Control Act of 1992, 22 U.S.C. 5859a (as amended). It covers the period from October 1 through December 31, 2002.

This report sets forth the Department's activities and associated costs of \$210,815.00 incurred supporting the United Nations Monitoring, Verification, and Inspections Commission (UNMOVIC) and the International Atomic Energy Agency Iraq Nuclear Verification Office (IAEA INVO) in two functional areas: chemical and biological weapons programs, and technical consultation. There were no costs incurred this quarter for ballistic missile programs, nuclear programs, aerial surveillance or long term monitoring. None of the costs were for direct funding assistance.

Following passage of the United Nations Security Council Resolution 1441 on November 8, 2002, UNMOVIC and IAEA INVO resumed inspection activities in Iraq in late November 2002. We anticipate that future quarterly reports will reflect an increased level of DoD support.

A copy of this report has been provided to the appropriate Congressional committees.

### **Section I - Introduction**

This quarterly report provides a description of the activities and a statement of costs for the Department of Defense (DoD) support to the United Nations Monitoring, Verification and Inspection Commission (UNMOVIC) and the International Atomic Energy Agency Iraq Nuclear Verification Office (IAEA INVO).

### **Section II - Background**

The United Nations (UN) Security Council passed Resolution 687 on April 3, 1991. This resolution dictated the terms for the cease-fire in Iraq and required Iraq to declare its weapons of mass destruction and facilitate their destruction. The resolution established the United Nations Special Commission on Iraq (UNSCOM) to implement the provisions of the resolution, and directed the International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA), with the assistance and cooperation of UNSCOM, to assume responsibility for provisions dealing with the nuclear program.

UN Security Council Resolution 1284, passed December 17, 1999, reaffirmed Resolution 687 and all subsequent resolutions dealing with Iraq and its weapons of mass destruction. The resolution established the United Nations Monitoring, Verification and Inspection Commission (UNMOVIC) as the successor to UNSCOM, and reaffirmed the role of the IAEA. Following the passage of United Nations Security Council Resolution 1441 on November 8, 2002, UNMOVIC and IAEA INVO resumed inspection activities in Iraq in late November 2002.

The Weapons of Mass Destruction Control Act of 1992, 22 U.S.C. 5859a, authorized DoD to provide assistance in support of UNSCOM and the IAEA. The Act, as amended to date, continues to authorize DoD support to UN weapons inspection and monitoring activities in Iraq conducted by UNMOVIC and the IAEA INVO.

Costs incurred by DoD for this support are reported in six program areas: chemical and biological weapons programs; ballistic missile programs; nuclear programs; aerial surveillance; long-term monitoring; and staff administration, technical and multi-program support.

**Section IV - Support Details for First Quarter FY 2003**

Incurred costs reflect the full cost of all supplies, equipment, services provided, and military and civilian salary costs, above and beyond the costs of the defined DTRA mission, that are in direct support to UNMOVIC and IAEA INVO.

Incremental costs are pro rata costs attributable to UNMOVIC/IAEA INVO support; that is, work performed from within DTRA staffing and resource levels in the conduct of UNMOVIC/IAEA INVO support. These pro rata costs are billed based on hourly rates.

In accordance with the Weapons of Mass Destruction Control Act of 1992, 22 U.S.C 5958a (as amended), the Department of Defense provides support to United Nations inspection and monitoring activities in Iraq conducted by UNMOVIC and IAEA INVO. Support is provided in the following six program areas:

**Program I: Chemical and Biological Weapons Programs**

A. The amounts spent for such activities and the purposes for which they were spent are:

\$ 100,000 (\$ 100,000 incremental)

Funding for FY03 chemical and biological technical support services.

B. The description of the participation of the DoD is:

Personnel, technical and materiel support for Chemical Weapons (CW)/Biological Weapons (BW) inspections, sampling, and support activities.

C. A description of the activities for which the funds were spent is:

Funding made available in anticipation of future support activities.

D. A description for the overall program is:

Activities relevant to the investigation, analysis, and destruction of Iraqi chemical and biological weapons programs. These activities include, but are not limited to: in-country laboratory sample analysis; area sampling; on-site inspections to determine stocks of agents, evaluate capabilities of related subsystems and components, and examine all

related research, development, support, and manufacturing processes; and reports, analyses or other documentation of these activities and related subjects.

**Program II: Ballistic Missile Programs**

A. The amounts spent for such activities and the purposes for which they were spent are:

No costs incurred this quarter.

B. The description of the participation of the DoD is:

Personnel, technical, and materiel support for ballistic missile activities.

C. A description of the activities for which the funds were spent is:

No activities this quarter.

D. A description for the overall program is:

Activities relevant to the investigation, analysis, and destruction of Iraqi ballistic missiles with a range greater than 150 kilometers. These activities include, but are not limited to: remote sensing; on-site inspections; removal of equipment for analysis; destruction of missiles and the means to manufacture them; and reports, analyses or other documentation of these activities and related subjects.

**Program III: Nuclear Programs**

A. The amounts spent for such activities and the purpose for which they were spent are:

No costs incurred this quarter.

B. The description of the participation of DoD is:

Personnel and technical support for IAEA INVO activities.

C. A description of the activities for which the funds were spent is:

No activities this quarter.

D. A description of the overall program is:

Activities relevant to the on-site inspection of Iraqi equipment and facilities that could be used to develop nuclear weapons or nuclear weapons-usable material, any subsystems or components, or any related research, development, support or manufacturing facilities. These activities include, but are not limited to: assisting the IAEA INVO, as required, in the removal and/or destruction of such equipment or facilities; and reports, analyses or other documentation of these activities and related subjects.

**Program IV: Aerial Surveillance**

A. The amounts spent for such activities and the purposes for which they were spent are:

No costs incurred this quarter.

B. The description of the participation of the DoD is:

Personnel, technical, materiel and logistics support for all forms of aerial surveillance.

C. A description of the activities for which the funds were spent is:

No activities this quarter.

D. A description for the overall program is:

Activities relevant to the use of aerial surveillance to facilitate the UNMOVIC and IAEA missions, as well as film processing, reports, analyses or other documentation of these activities and related subjects.

**Program V: Long-term Monitoring**

Personnel, technical and materiel support for long-term monitoring activities.

DoD military and civilian personnel to support planning, coordination, and execution of program activities, specifically to maintain a minimum level of readiness for resumption of activities and prepare for future activities.

D. A description for the overall program is:

Activities required to ensure that the Department of Defense efficiently carries out its obligations to support UNMOVIC and the IAEA INVO. These activities include, but are not limited to: ensuring appropriate military and civilian staff support exists to meet DoD support requirements; engaging in travel to consult with UNMOVIC/ IAEA INVO staff and other technical experts; efforts expended in support of more than one program

above or in support of overall UNMOVIC and IAEA/INVO operations; and reports, analyses or other documentation of these activities and related subjects.
